A music-based learning resource pack for families

Here at darts, we wanted to make it easier for you to make music at home with the little people in your lives, so we have created a series of resource packs based around some of our favourite story books. Our musicians have come up with some creative ideas, songs and rhymes that you can do to bring the story to life. We have tried to cater for as many families as possible, so some of these activities are aimed at very young people, and some are aimed at slightly older children. These are only ideas, so feel free to pick the bits you like, change activities to suit you all and to add in anything that you think we have missed!

Most importantly, try not to worry about the music making – the interaction and communication with your child, encouraged by these ideas, is far more important than whether you sing the songs note perfect! Also, don't feel bad for repeating the same handful of songs that you feel confident with – repetition and familiarity are great at this stage and will encourage your child to join in at their own level – whether that be with speech, vocalisation and noises or physical gestures. Try repeating the activities at different speeds and with different voices to add variety.






Makaton


























Owl Ears

A really simple activity that you can do with your child absolutely anywhere.

Take a few minutes to sit still and listen. Just listen. Like an Owl


A lovely, yet simple action song sung to the tune of London Bridge. Come up with your own actions for each verse and do them in time to the music.




Colour game
